



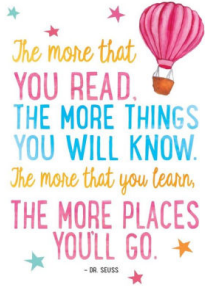
5th Grade Supply List

Welcome to the 5th grade! Because space is limited in the classroom, it is important to follow these guidelines for supplies. These quantities are the maximum needed, however some supplies do get used up or run out, so be prepared to replace them. Things such as notebooks and paper will need to be restocked throughout the year, and other things may be requested. Extras may be kept at home until needed at school. Please label all supplies with the student's name, except for those things that will be collected and distributed.

1. 1 box of 24- #2 "Ticonderoga" pencils sharpened *
 2. 1 set of markers (8-12 count, classic colors, fine line/tip) NO Sharpies
 3. 1 box colored pencils (8-12 count)
 4. 1 small, manual, self-contained pencil sharpener (NOT electric)
 5. 1 pair, pointed scissors
 6. 1 pack magic erasers
 7. 5 large glue sticks
 8. 1 pack square multi-colored post-its
 9. 5 wide ruled composition books (**blue, green, yellow, purple, choice of color**)
 10. 1 quad ruled graph notebook for Math
 11. 6 plastic/poly-vinyl two-pocket folders (**blue, green, yellow, red, orange, choice of color**)
 12. 2 packs lined college-ruled binder paper (to be kept in your desk)
 13. 1 small personal stapler
 14. 1 ruler, metric and inches
 15. 1 container of disinfecting wipes (handy wipes)*
 16. 1 pocket dictionary
 17. 2 boxes of tissues (large size)*
 18. 3 dry-erase marker *
 19. 1 roll of standard kitchen paper towels

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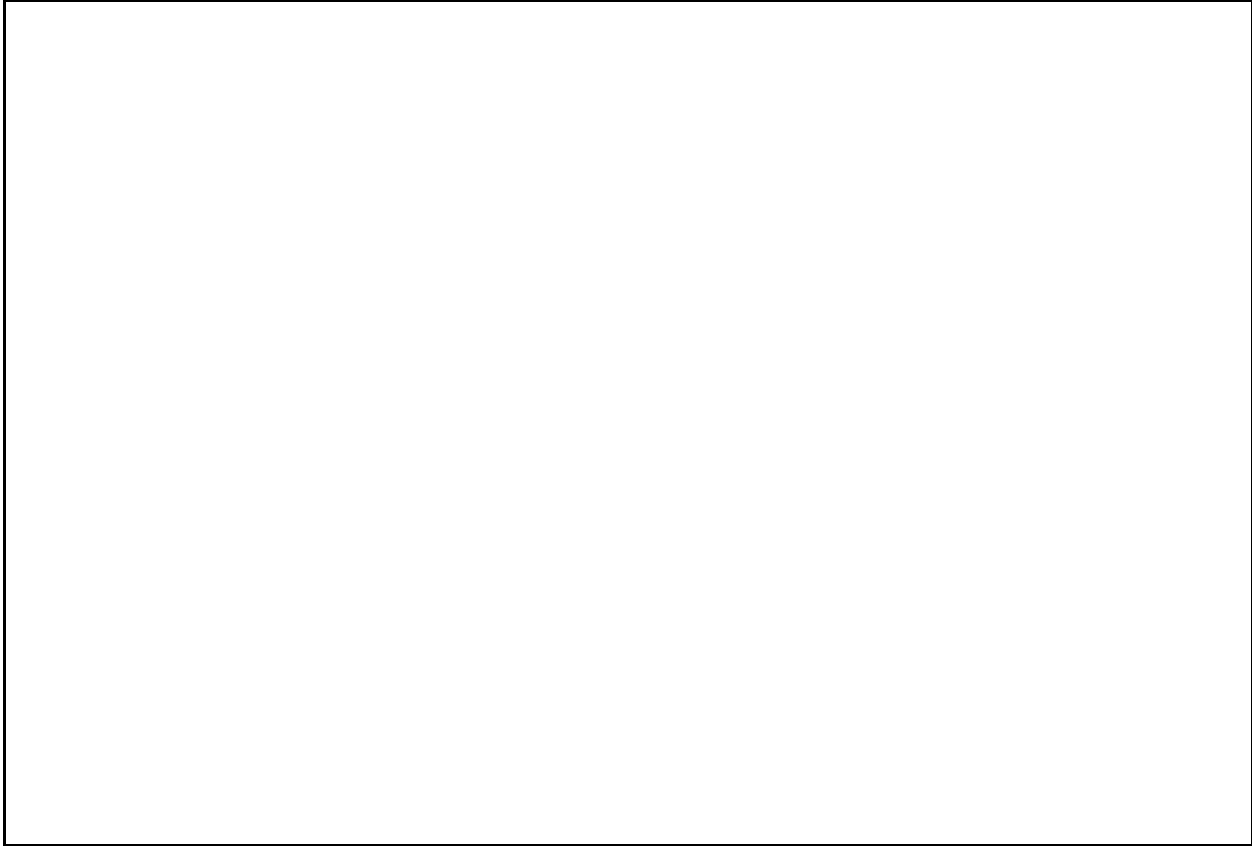

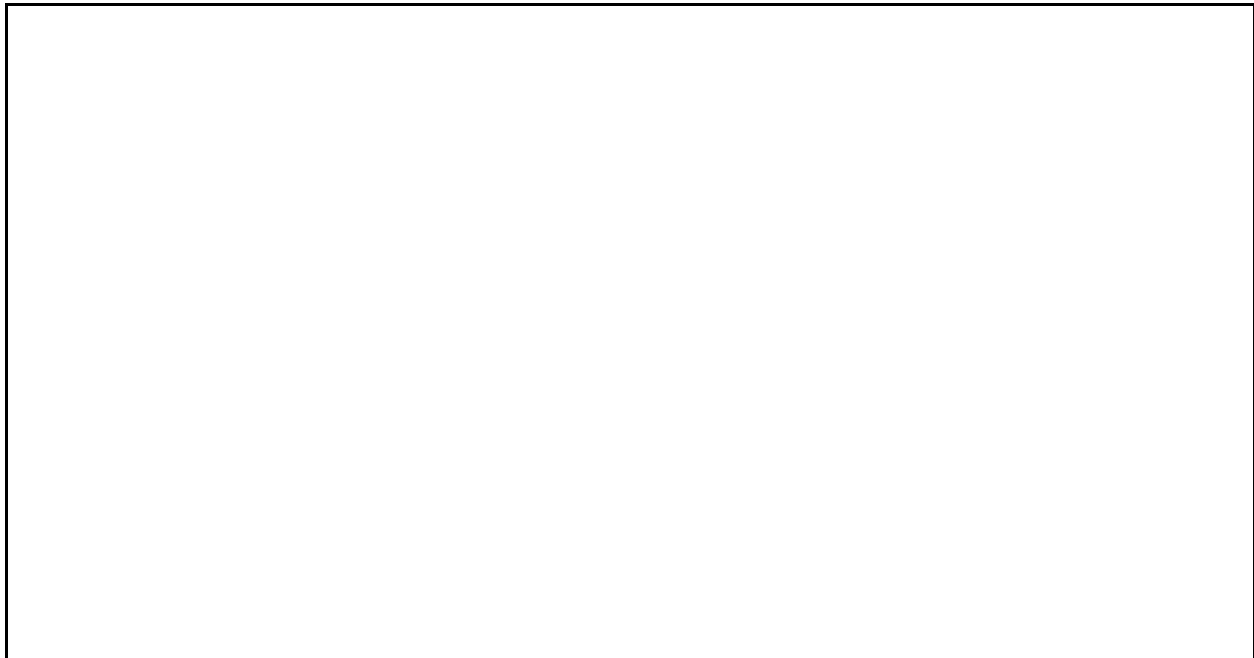
